A Bright Future for Tiferet Israel Congregation

At services on the 7th day of Pesach, Meir Lewin, our Torah reader, gave a short d'var Torah that spoke directly to Tiferet Israel. The Parsha that day is the story of the splitting of the sea, the Jewish people crossing through, escaping the Egyptians, and celebrating their escape to freedom on the other side. Meir posed the question "Why did Miriam and the women escaping from Egypt have time to pack their tambourines when they did not have time to bake bread?" He the commentaries said that explain the women were so certain Hashem would perform miracles they brought tambourines. Meir said this simple explanation is a powerful message about faith trust. When facing difficult times, being strong is important; so is having faith.

Transforming Tiferet Israel into a vibrant Modern Orthodox community and re-engaging with our members post-COVID are very exciting opportunities that involve every aspect of our lives at Tiferet. Many of the changes we will be confronting will be emotionally charged.

Deciding Rabbi Meir Sabo would be our next Religious Leader was only the first step. All of the operating elements of Tiferet Israel must be re-imagined in a post COVID, Modern Orthodox context: Membership, Programming, Education, Building and Grounds, Finance, and Office Operations. Regarding Ritual, our religious services have been Orthodox since our founding so our ritual practices will remain the same except for the issue of separate versus mixed seating.

Mixed versus separate seating has been an evolving conversation throughout Tiferet Israel's 132 year history. Gerry Cristol in her book A Light in the Prairie, Temple Emanu El of Dallas 1872-1997 says on page 54, "...Tiferet Israel was formed when some traditionalists who considered joining Shearith Israel...were deterred from doing so because the sexes were not separated." Rose Biderman in her book They Came to Stay, the Story of the Jews of Dallas 1870 - 1997, explains on page 135 that Tiferet Israel's first permanent building on Highland Street (near what is now the American Airlines Arena) had a mechitza. When a new facility was built on Grand Avenue in the early 1940's, the building did not have a mechitza but had separate seating for men in the front and for women in the back. In 1942, the congregation voted to make the two back rows mixed seating to attract younger members. In 1955, the Tiferet

Israel families moved to North Dallas after less than 20 years in the building on Grand Avenue and there was no mechitza.

During COVID, we learned to meet and have programs using online services such as Zoom, and we envision continuing to use these tools. We will also be creating inperson programs and services. Connecting in-person as a community is an essential human need and one that cannot be substituted completely online. The in-person human connection in a Jewish environment is a need the synagogue must meet.

We ask each of our members and supporters to be patient as we design and implement programs, and revamp membership services to better serve our newly imagined community.

Our success in the transformation of Tiferet Israel to a vibrant post-COVID, Modern Orthodox community will require us to proceed with faith and trust to ensure Tiferet Israel's survival for another 132 years.

May Hashem bless our efforts with wisdom and strength. And, please, bring your tambourines.



Synchronicities on the Avenue of the Saints by Deborah Gaal

Here is a magical realism/conundrum/thriller that will keep you on the edge of your seat. Here's the lowdown – Book-Life-Physicist, Noah Friedman, is bipolar and is racing against time before the experimental drug he is currently taking steals his mind, then his life. His deranged psychiatrist is aiming to clear \$10 million on the sales of this drug and has become Noah's enemy. As Noah starts his quest to free himself from the drug and the doctor, he soon finds himself with a coterie of odd compatriots: Noah's burnt-out and misguided but loving mom, Sally, Jean-Paul, an African shaman and mentor who steers Noah on his path, Noah's struggling journalist friend Fleck, and a Russian Revolution-era ghost who demands Noah right an old wrong, or else. Together they work to stop the world-wide launch of the deadly drug. At the same time, a pharmaceutical kingpin is intent on raiding the Friedman family business and has been using Sally to do so. Can Noah right the wrongs of his ancestors in time to heal himself, save his mother, and also prove that love creates synchronicity with what and who is loved?

The Passing of an Icon

When someone passes away, there's a rippling effect on the lives that person has touched. When it comes to the loss of a legend, that effect is enormous. Recently, the Jewish community suffered a devastating loss with the passing of a great man of honor, Erv Rovinsky of blessed memory. Erv was a loving husband, father, grandfather and great grandfather, a renaissance man, engineer, Zionist, soldier, singer, teacher, student and friend to all. He was a quiet man, always willing to offer wise advice and ready to help anyone in need.

At Tiferet Israel, Erv wore many hats; past president many times, head of ritual committee, gabbai emeritus, executive board member and a regular attendee at daily minyans. Erv was an extremely hard worker, who worked full time into his 90s, and like the great sages of the past, when Erv wasn't working he was studying Jewish texts.

When it came to hospitality, Erv and his beloved wife, Shirley, had no equals — Shabbat dinners, holiday meals, dinner in the sukkah — their home was open to all. Back in the good old days it was common for a group of men to walk with Erv to his home after shul on a Friday night and have a traditional lechaim, which always included a celebratory shot of vodka, before heading home. And if you were fortunate enough to be invited to Erv and Shirley's house for one of their amazing Shabbat dinners, you would hear stories of what the Dallas Jewish community was like in the "old days."

I will always remember Erv's soothing voice when doing kiddush, and Erv substituting the word "idleness" for "sloth" during his reciting of Eshet Chayil. At the end of this song of praise to his wife Shirley, he would add his own comment of "We love you ladies." I never asked Erv why he said that because he did in fact 'love the ladies.' But upon reflection I believe Erv added that because when Erv and Shirley had a single woman at their Shabbat table, Erv in his typical kind way wanted to include everyone in his praise.

At Erv's funeral service, which was so crowded that there was standing room only, I couldn't help noticing the people who showed up. They were from diverse organizations and synagogues throughout the community. From orthodox to traditional to conservative to reform, there was a common theme that Erv had touched their lives in a special way. To Erv, a Jew was a Jew no matter his or her affiliation.

In the award winning film, "To Sir with Love," starring Sydney Portier, there's a famous song that contains the following lyrics. "But how do you thank someone who has taken you from crayons to perfume. It isn't easy, but I'll try."

These words reflect how we all feel. How do we thank Erv for teaching us how to be better Jews as well as better people? He would probably tell us to increase our Jewish knowledge, appreciate the beauty of Jewish life and be kind to our fellow man.

Erv, thank you for being an inspiration to a generation of Jewish men and women and leading by example. You have set the gold standard for us all and taught us how a righteous Jew should lead their life. You will be greatly missed.
